


## The Numbers in 2019

- 40,656 people visited the Preserve and Nature Center
- There were a total of **4,531** volunteers contributing to the Nature Center and Preserve
- Volunteers donated **14,664** working hours to the operation and maintenance of the Preserve. At \$29 per hour, which is the standard hourly amount used by the City to calculate volunteer hours, these volunteers saved the City of Torrance the extraordinary sum of \$425,256.

### **Community Partners**

This summer Nature Center staff, led by Melissa Loebl, Naturalist/Manager converted all kitchen goods to compostable, non-plastic or reusable metal and china. It is significant that the Nature Center is leading the way for the City of Torrance in valuing our environment.

## **Educational Programs**

#### **Docent Tours for Student Study Trips**

We really outdid ourselves this year. Our docents led 151 tours for 1769 students and 290 chaperones. That's a total of 2059 people!

Torrance Schools that participated were Anza, Carr, Edison, Fern, Hickory, Victor, The South Bay High School and El Camino College.

Schools groups also came from Carson, Culver City, El Segundo, Gardena, Hawthorne, Lawndale, Lomita, Los Angeles, Rancho Palos Verdes, Palos Redondo Beach and San Pedro.

#### **Docents Align Tours with California Earth Science Education Standards**



A group of docents worked with the Torrance Unified School District to align our docent led tours with K-5 California Earth Science standards. This creates a field experience that reinforces classroom learning for teachers and students visiting the Nature Center and Preserve.

#### **Participants in Docent Tours for the Community**

- Audubon Bird Walks included 133 participants.
- Three Senior Strolls were offered in 2019 and 30 people participated.
- Nature Stories & Crafts for young children with 390 participants.
- Friday Fun is a weekly preschool nature science program that was attended by 2,063 children and their parents.
- Girl Scout nature related Badges were earned by 101 Girl Scouts.
- Tyke Hikes was attended by 210 infants, toddlers and their parents. Tyke Hikes is a monthly program targeting young children aged birth-3.
- 302 community members' adults and children participated in Tour de Torrance.
- 199 participated in Nature Walks.
- 139 individuals went on a Birding with Bob Shanman walk.

In addition to docent led tours for students, young children and the community, the Friends also maintain a website and publish a quarterly newsletter, The Marsh Mailer, for members. Members may continue to receive their newsletter in the mail or request a copy in full vibrant color via email.



In Memory of **Shirley Turner** 

Shirley is synonymous with the effort to save and restore the Madrona Marsh. For many years she attended City Council meetings and advocated for preserving the Marsh. She single-handedly wrote and published stories for the news. She contacted scout troops, Y groups, schools and more to introduce them to the Marsh. Shirley was one of the earliest and strongest proponents of restoration and persuaded many groups to participate.

There is a painting of Shirley in the Nature Center lobby. You may wonder about the chain link fence behind her. It is a reminder that efforts to save the Marsh go back many years ... to when it was still privately owned and we could only walk the perimeter.

Shirley passed away March 24, 2019, and will be greatly missed by all who knew her.





### **Fundraising**
