Who are the Friends of Madrona Marsh?

The Friends of Madrona Marsh is a non-profit, community-based, volunteer organization whose goal is to work toward the preservation, restoration and appropriate use of the Madrona Marsh Preserve. Toward these ends The Friends will pursue restoration and enhancement of the Preserve habitat, offer programs to educate the community about the natural history of the South Bay, maintain a volunteer program to provide docents and other volunteers to implement the policies of the Friends. The Friends shall also conduct fundraising to provide financial support for the Preserve and Nature Center. FOMM shall advocate these policies to the City of Torrance and the Community.

Restoration 2016

- The Friends Board continued to support the Upland restoration. Headed by Dan Portway, his team continued the enhancing and maintenance of local native upland perineal and annual plants over a 3 acre area. A few highlights are:
 - Many annuals have bloomed and have really spread around, particularly the tansy mustard, purple clarkia, arroyo lupine, and collar/truncated lupine.
 - Some yellowstar, blue dick, brodea, and mariposa lilies flowered and many are naturally spreading thru seedlings and off-shoots.
 - Vernal pool #2 is relatively weed free and supported a bloom of both tar plants.
 - We lost about 10% of our buckwheat to drought and gophers, but new volunteer seedlings have sprouted to replace them.
- Tony Baker has continued maintenance of the Native Plant and Water-Wise Garden outside the Nature Center, and a very large local native annual plant area just inside the Preserve main entrance.
- The Propagation Society supplies' both plants and seeds for our restoration efforts.
- The Board allocated \$22,920 for restoration in 2016 and has invested \$145,309 over the past three years.



The First Inventory

Over the years, the Friends have been called upon to provide necessary equipment and furnishings that are not in the Nature Center budget, items as varied as PowerPoint projectors to exhibit cases to grass mowers to microscopes. Many of these items were purchased out of the Friends' general funds, others were purchased with funds donated to the Friends specifically for that purpose and still other items were donated directly to the Friends. A generous grant from Alcoa Corporation has provided for the installation of a system of wildlife cameras and monitors plus the weather station and the digital display seen in the lobby of the Nature Center. In 2016 the Friends put together an inventory of this equipment so we could keep track of its use. Altogether, the Friends have provided equipment worth more than \$170,000 in the last fifteen years.

Partnerships

We are proud of our community partnerships that significantly improve the Friends ability to fulfill our responsibilities.

- **Torrance Refinery** has become the newest supporter of the nature Center and preserve. The Torrance Refinery donated \$2500 in 2016 to support continuation of our restoration on the preserve and new habitats for the Nature Center.
- **South Bay Marriott** is a continuing friend to the Preserve and Nature Center with an entirely new idea this past year. The Marriotts restaurant serves a delicious Madrona Burger and donates \$1.00 to the Friends for every burger sold. In 2016 this amounted to a donation of \$4856.
- **Walser's** is a Torrance art store that also does electronic recycling. Walsers generously shares a portion of their profits from electronic recycling

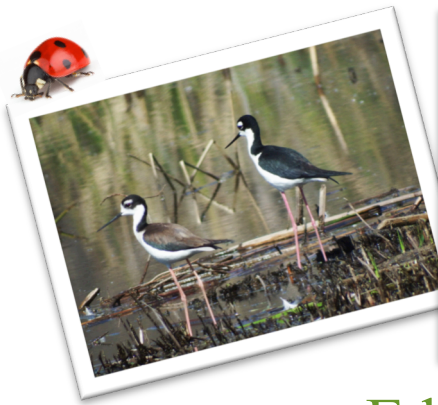
FOMM Website

Educational Experiences

During the past year, volunteers offered a wonderful assortment of educational opportunities for all ages.

Educational Programs and Events The Friends hosted numerous programs and events for the community including:

- Tyke Hikes is a monthly docent led tour of the Preserve designed for infants to 3 year olds.
- 1496 children and parents attended Fun Friday. This is a weekly science program which includes a themed classroom experience and a tour of the Preserve for children 3-6.
- 266 students participated in Home School Classes which are offered twice a month September – June for 7-9 year olds
- Production of a quarterly Newsletter, The Marsh Mailer
- Maintained a mobile friendly website
- Out of the Wilds and into your Garden classes



Docent Tours for Students and Adults

A grand total of 1690 students and 240 adults participated in our docent led tours. Docent Tours for Torrance Schools were attended by 833 students and 92 adults.

- 755 students pre-K through 4th grade
- 78 college students

Torrance Unified Schools participating include Anza, Carr, Hickory, Torrance, Towers, Victor and Woods. Non-Torrance private and public schools attending include 857 students and 148 adults from Carson, Hawthorne, Lawndale, Lomita, Los Angeles, Pasadena, Redondo Beach, Rolling Hills, San Pedro and Wilmington.

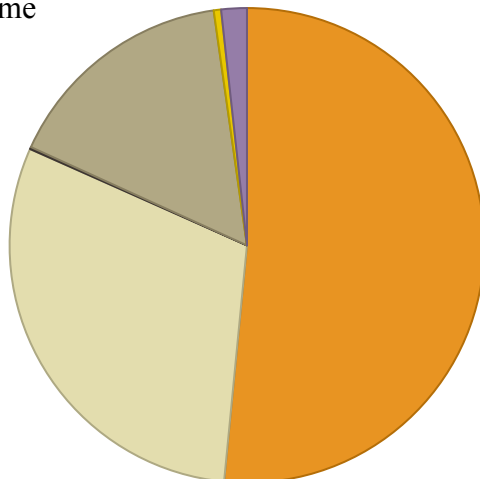


What the numbers tell us about 2016

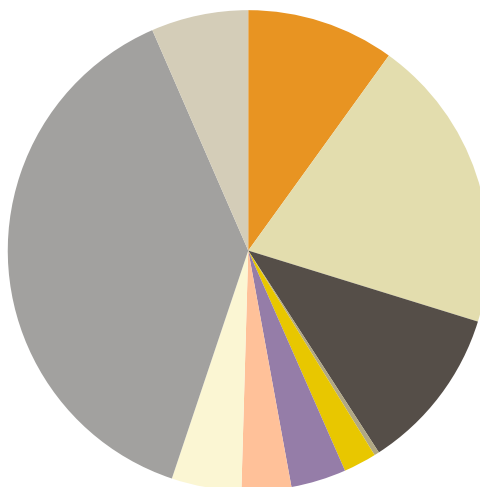
- 35,534 people visited the Preserve and Nature Center
- 10,294 people attended our scheduled events and programs.
- There were a total of 5650 volunteers contributing to the Nature Center and Preserve
- Volunteers donated 14488 working hours to the operation and maintenance of the Madrona Marsh Preserve and Nature Center.
- At \$15.00 per hour these volunteers saved the City of Torrance \$217,320 in 2016.
