The unthinkable happened. It only lasted about a week.
In late November, Southern California art house chain Laemnle abrupty announced it was pulling out of the Music Hall Theatre, where it had been showing movies for more than 40 years. atre, where it had been showing movies for more than 40 years. Combined with Laemmle ceasing operations at the Fine Arts Theatre a mile or so east on Wilshire Boulevard earlier in the month, it looked for a brief moment like Beverly Hills — a community as tightly associated with the film business as Hollward for a cent business as Hollywood for a cen-tury – would not have any place where the public could buy a ticket to the movies.

ticket to the movies.

Eight days later, that was no longer the case.

On Nov. 29, one current and two former Laemmle employees reopened the three-screen Music Hall. Pooling their own funds, Peter Ambrosio, Lauren Brown and Luis Orellana formed Lumiere Cinema and quickly cut deals with the property's landlord to operate the theater for at least operate the theater for at least another year, and with Laemmle to inherit projectors and other

Rainfall brings wetland to life

Madrona Marsh transformation captured by drone photographs

A Torrance drone company has vividly cap-tured how almost 5 inches of rain in a little more than a month transformed city-owned Madrona Marsh — one of the last remaining fragments of vernal wetland in the county — from a dour brown into a breathtaking splash of green habi-tat providing an important wildlife refuge among

tat providing an important wildlife refuge among the urban landscape.

The soggy winter so far has seen state reservoirs reach historic highs and produced picture-perfect snowpack levels in the mountains.

And two weeks ago, the Madrona Marsh Nature Preserve released images taken by Sky Ladder Drones on Nov. 21 and Dec. 21 that illustrate how the 4.87 inches of rain that fell between those dates replenished a seasonal ecosystem solely dependent on rainfall.

"The marsh comes to life," said chief drone pilot and company owner Steven Katz, who live

iot and company owner Steven Katz, who lives nearby.

"This is a composite of 399 pictures, so it's low altitude pictures taken at 300 feet, so they're extremely high resolution," he added. "If you're a photography geek, the camera that's flown is a 20 megapixel camera."

Volcano gushes lava, spreads ash clouds, forcing villagers to flee

TAGAYTAY, PHILIPPINES » Red-hot lava gushed out of a Philippine volcano early today after a sud-den eruption of ash and steam that forced villag-ers to flee and shut down Manila's international

ers to flee and shut down Manila's international airport, offices and schools.

There were no immediate reports of casualties or major damage from Taal volcano's eruption south of the capital that began Sunday. But clouds of ash blew more than 62 miles north, reaching the bustling capital, Manila, and forcing the shutdown of the country's main airport with more than 240 international and domestic flights corpused so for.

flights canceled so far.

An alternative airport north of Manila at Clark freeport remained open but authorities would shut it down too if ashfall threatens flights, the Civil Aviation Authority of the Philippines said. VOLCANO » PAGE 6

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
